



## Forest County Potawatomi Leaders XI

This is the next instalment of the Leaders series, and is an ongoing collaboration between FCP Cultural Center, Library & Museum and the Potawatomi Traveling Times.



**Ned George Daniels** was born Aug. 19, 1916, at White Rapids to Young George and Alice (Benn) George. After Young George passed away, Alice married Bill Daniels Sr.

Ned Daniels attended Kokomo School at Stone Lake in the 1930s. He went on to Lawrenceville, Kansas, to attend what is now known as Haskell Indian Nations University. A letter he wrote while at Haskell to Kokomo School teacher George Kerr in 1939 appeared in the November 15, 2010, edition of the Potawatomi Traveling Times. Ned learned general trades and graduated from the Haskell Pontiac Vocational school in Kansas in 1944, according to an article in the *PTT* published in November 1995 (page 7).

He married Josephine Johnson in 1944. After living in other parts of Wisconsin for a while and working as a welder at various companies, Ned Daniels Sr. and Josephine moved their growing family back to Forest County in the 1950s.

Ned Daniels Sr. succeeded Harvey Tucker as tribal chairman in 1973 and served as tribal chairman for two terms. In addition to his time as chair-



**Lois Jean Crowe** was born in Blackwell on Aug. 18, 1931, to Louis and Mabel Keene Pemma. She attended Haskell Indian Boarding School and went on to receive her nursing degree in Chicago. Crowe made history when she was elected as the Forest County Potawatomi Community's first and only female tribal chairperson on Nov. 3, 1975.

In 1976, she attended a meeting in Washington, D.C., along with other tribal chairpersons. She met U.S. President Gerald Ford on that occasion.

Crowe served as the education director for approximately 20 years, and according to her son, Daniel "DJ" Smith (as relayed to *PTT* by Kaye Garcia), she was the Gaming Commissioner chairperson who signed the gaming compact with the state of Wisconsin. (cited from *PTT* June 15, 2017 issue)

Before and after her time as tribal chairperson, Crowe was involved with many tribal affairs. Among her many roles over the years, she served as the tribe's nurse recruiter, the FCP ANA (Administration for Native Americans) planner, the tribal education director, and the first Forest County Potawatomi Bingo commissioner. Crowe also served on the FCP Tribal Enrollment Committee.



In 1977, James Thunder succeeded her as tribal chairman.

Lois Crowe passed away on Jan. 27, 1995. She was survived by her husband, Osborne Crowe, and three sons.

Today, a road on the FCP Community reservation is named for her. There is also a scholarship that was started by the FCP Foundation in 2017 in honor of Crowe, along with two other tribal members that have held education to the highest degree.





# Annual Zach Shawano Memorial 9-Pin Bowling Tournament

## Scheduled for Saturday, August 21, 2021

The Shawano family is pleased to announce that its annual memorial bowling tournament to celebrate the life of Zach Shawano will resume this year! After a year's hiatus due to the pandemic, the 9-pin event will again be held at Hodag Lanes in Rhinelander on Saturday, August 21, beginning at 3 p.m.

The purpose of the event is twofold. First, it's an opportunity for family and friends to celebrate the life of Zach – beloved son, grandson, brother, uncle, nephew, husband, father – a young man with so much promise who was tragically taken in a car accident at the age of 26 back in 2015. By all accounts, Zach was a positive, caring and generous person who is missed dearly.

Secondly, because of these traits that

speak so well of who Zach was, the family chose to make the event a scholarship fundraiser in his honor. But this is not your typical scholarship. Students don't have to apply, and they don't have to meet specific academic criteria. Rather, this scholarship is geared toward those students who may have had experiences that make life more challenging when it comes to continuing their education – students that work hard and strive to succeed in spite of the challenges. With that goal in mind, family members contacted area schools to ask for their help in identifying students that could use a helping hand based on any number of reasons.

The first fundraising event was held in 2019 and as a result, three \$500 scholarships were awarded in 2020 to:

- Hope Dewing: Crandon High School graduate, third year at UW-Green Bay pursuing Elementary Education

- Halle Reeder: Crandon High School graduate, will attend UW-Stevens Point in pursuit of a degree in Secondary Education

- Isabelle Thomaschefske: Three Lakes High School graduate, will attend Nicolet Area Technical College for an Associates degree in Human Services

Three scholarships were awarded in June 2021. Recipients are:

- Serra Angel Laubert: Crandon High School graduate, will attend UW-MKE to pursue a degree in Social Work

- Zack McLaughlin: Crandon High School graduate, will attend Northern Michigan Tech to pursue a Mechanical

Engineering degree

- Natalie Berg: Crandon High School graduate, will attend Northern Michigan Tech to pursue Veterinary Medicine

The Shawano family is thankful for the opportunity to give back to the community on Zach's behalf, and wish all recipients the best of luck in achieving their goals.

It's in this spirit that they invite you to join them on August 21 for an afternoon of fun and laughter as they remember and celebrate their loved one. ## Groundbreaking: GATEWAY LOFTS

Land Quest hosted a groundbreaking earlier this week to kick off Gateway Lofts, a new housing project in Kenosha. The adaptive reuse of a former medical building adjacent to Gateway Technical College will provide affordable student housing. "The close proximity of the campus will provide the best experience for our students looking to experience student housing life," said Gateway Technical College President, Bryan Albrecht. The project has also received great support from the City of Kenosha Mayor John Martin Antaramian who was also in attendance.

## Groundbreaking: COMMUNITY WITHIN THE CORRIDOR

Scott Crawford Inc., Roers Companies and Greenfire hosted a groundbreaking for Community Within The Corridor last week. This event launched the beginning of the residential mixed use development located on Milwaukee's Northside neighborhood. The historic renovation of the former Briggs & Stratton complex sprawls across 7 acres along 32nd Street and Center Street and consists of six buildings totaling 380,000 square feet. The project has received many tax credits including state and federal historical preservation credits, low-income housing credits, and municipal assistance from the State of Wisconsin. This development has been 5 years in the making according to Lead Principal of the project Que El-Amin.

"The Community Within the Corridor aims to provide the proper resources to build a sustainable family, because we know families are the key to success in America," Que El-Amin said.

Community Within The Corridor is the largest privately owned affordable housing development in Wisconsin and the first of its kind in Milwaukee's northside neighborhood. Greenfire Management Services has already preformed demolition work, conducted lead, asbestos and contaminated soil tests and is now currently installing underground plumbing. This \$66 million dollar development will provide 197 affordable housing units, laundromat, daycare, two community lounges, a food hall, recording and dance studios, podcast rooms, and mental health services. This development ensures that those in the community will not have to go outside of their domain to receive services, but rather continue to build the community up further for generations to come.
