It was a cool and brisk evening as Forest County Potawatomi (FCP) and surrounding area members gathered at the Potawatomi Community Center for the 7th annual Sobriety Powwow on New Year's Eve. The evening began with a feast at 5 p.m. Vendors worked on setting up their displays of regalia, handcrafted bead work, apparel, blankets, and more. A snack booth was also available throughout the night, featuring a variety of nachos, bubble tea, and more.

While waiting for the grand march to begin at 7 p.m., MC Dylan Prescott entertained visitors and invited everyone to the gym. He shared how we all made it another year around the sun. Prescott continued introducing FCP Community Prevention Coordinator

Jorge Cisneros Sr. for the evening as everyone gathered for the grand march, inviting him to talk about the Sobriety Powwow, why we have it, and what it is all about.

Cisneros began by sharing his nine years of sobriety with the audience. He continued, "Our culture is prevention. We're teaching our children to pick up sewing needles instead of heroin needles. We're teaching our young ones to pick up these pwagens instead of crack pipes. Some people might not want to hear these things, but these are the things we need to talk about. That's why we're here, to share these things and let our people know what is good and what is not good." Cisneros concluded with a prayer for the evening.

To commence the 2024 Sobriety Powwow celebrations, the FCP Veteran color guard led the grand entry, followed by this year's head

dancers Reddmen Lemieux Sr. and Sarah Gougé, royalty, and participating dancers. Proceeding, royalty and head dancers introduced themselves to the audience in both Potawatomi and English languages.

Throughout the night, various spot dances were available for dancers to join in on. Male dancers were invited to participate with head dancer Lemieux, and female dancers were invited to do the same with head dancer Gougé. There was also a danceoff between Potawatomi Princess Lovey VanZile and FCP Assistant Fitness Manager Travis Thelen. The crowd cheered the two of them on loud and proud as it came time for the final vote. With the audience's help, the dance-off winner was Miss Lovey VanZile.

Raffle prizes were drawn throughout the evening, featuring a variety

of flat-screen TVs, garbage bins with cleaning supplies and toiletries, air fryers, cookware sets, blenders, and much more. Later that night, sobriety coins were presented to those for their years, months, and days of sobriety.

The Sobriety Powwow brought in an evening packed full of smiles, laughter, and memories that will last a lifetime. It's a time to celebrate the closing of another year, reflect on all it offered, and welcome a new year of gathering and celebrating sobriety. It's an opportunity for the community to come together, reflect on the battles they may have overcome, embrace strength and resilience, and hold the courage to continue this journey. We can and will overcome anything with the warm support of those who continue to come together.



enjoyable than watching the children tell Santa what they wanted for Christmas.



According to Fox Valley Grappling Club, Aviator Wrestling, founded in 2008, provides opportunities for wrestlers to train in the Greco and Freestyle wrestling areas. Over the years, their programs have grown to include scholastic-style wrestling training, clinics, and camps to focus on all aspects of wrestling. These programs have helped increase skill levels in areas wrestlers may be interested in learning, improving, or focusing on specific skills.


One individual who has taken an opportunity with Aviator Wrestling is Ryker Schingeck, one of Forest County Potawatomi's (FCP) very own. Schingeck joined Aviator's Wrestling Club and had the opportunity to train with Aviator Wrestling coach Jason Kleinschmidt to strengthen his wrestling skills and compete in the International Tour on Dec. 7, 2024.

The two recently traveled to Copa Jalisco de Clubes in Guadalajara, Mexico, where Shingeck placed second in Freestyle and Greco. In recognition of his achievements, Shingeck and Kleinschmidt met with the FCP Communications team to discuss their trip and share memories, stories, and experiences with the program.

Schingeck begins reflecting on his time with his coach and how his guidance has helped him maintain his focus and composure while on the wrestling mat. Kleinschmidt's supportive approach sets him apart from other coaches. He has helped him grow in a respected manner, reviewing things he must work on toward future competitions. Following Schingeck's experience in Mexico, his favorite wrestling style is Greco, despite being better at Freestyle. He shares that Greco allows him to have fun and enjoy what he's doing, whether he wins or loses.

Coach Kleinschmidt shares his experience with Schingeck on his coachability and the fact that he really listens to what you have to say. The most difficult part about traveling for the International Tour is that you cannot scout the wrestlers beforehand, so he always gives his wrestlers good techniques to prepare them for the competition.

Concluding, coach shares information about the program and the goals of his wrestlers. He expresses the fact that it's their ship they're sailing. At the end of the day, it comes down to them and what they want to do in the program. They're the ones that need to make that decision for themselves. Coach states that he is the vehicle to

International Conference of **Indigenous Archives Gather** in Cherokee, N.C.

The Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries, and Museums (ATALM announced that its 18th annual International Conference of Indigenous Archives, Libraries, and Museums will take place Oct. 7-9, 2025, in Cherokee, N.C. at the Harrah's Cherokee Casino Resort. The theme of this year's conference, "Moving Forward, Standing Strong," reflects the collective strength, resilience, and forward momentum of Indigenous cultural leaders and knowledge keepers.

The conference will feature tours of significant Native cultural sites and more than 100 concurrent sessions, panel discussions, and interactive workshops. National Planning Council Chair and Executive Director of the Museum of the Cherokee People Shana Bushyhead Condill, emphasized the importance of this year's location, stating, "Cherokee is a place of profound cultural and historical significance. The Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians embodies the strength and resilience that this year's theme celebrates. This conference is an opportunity to honor our heritage while advancing the work

of Indigenous cultural preservation and empowerment."

ATALM conferences are recognized for fostering an environment where diverse Indigenous communities collaborate to preserve knowledge, materials, and stories while empowering future generations. Chairman of ATALM's Board of Governors Walter Echo-Hawk (Pawnee), stated, "This year's theme underscores our commitment to progress and unity. ATALM conferences provide a unique space where Native communities come together to exchange ideas, share stories, and strengthen the bonds that sustain our cultures."


The conference is anticipated to attract more than 1,400 attendees from across the globe, including tribal leaders, cultural professionals, and advocates dedicated to Indigenous heritage. Major funding for the conference is provided by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), the Doris Duke Foundation, and the Ford Foundation.

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


