8th Annual Sobriety Powwow



Ringing in the new year

For some, New Year's Eve is synonymous with partying, complete with alcohol and festive party favors. However, the Forest County Potawatomi Community embraces a different approach to ringing in the New Year by celebrating the power of sobriety. On the frigid night of Dec. 31, 2025, attendees gathered at the Potawatomi Community Center for the 8th Annual New Year's Eve Sobriety Powwow.

Vendors set up displays showcasing handcrafted beadwork, ribbon skirts, shirts, and various other items, eager to share their creations. The evening

commenced with a feast at 5 p.m., allowing guests to socialize over a meal of Indian Tacos while anticipating the Grand Entry at 7 p.m. Led by Veterans Color Guard, the Grand Entry featured this year's head dancers, Donna VanZile and Bambi Shepard, along with royalty and participating dancers to kick off the night's festivities. MC Jeff Keeble Sr. shared his personal journey of sobriety and recovery, encouraging everyone present to commit to the path of sobriety and to help heal the community.

Many meaningful conversations emerged among those individuals committed to recovery and maintaining sobriety. Community Prevention Coordinator Jorge Cisneros Sr. shared the harsh realities he personally faced and his daily dedication to self-improvement. He emphasized, "Culture is prevention and always will be prevention," encouraging everyone in attendance to persist in the efforts they have made so far.

The FCP Behavioral Health Department provided prevention kits, Narcan, recovery resources, and offered an impaired driving demonstration for participants. Prevention & Recovery Program Director Angela Jacobson and Recovery Coach Consequela Alloway, presented sobriety coins and recognized those celebrating their

sober milestones. Numerous individuals shared their personal stories, highlighting their journeys toward achieving years, months, days, or even hours of sobriety.

The evening's entertainment featured various spot dances, giving participants the opportunity to win a cozy blanket or cash prizes by ending in designated spots set by arena director Richard Gouge. All the little ones who joined the Tiny Tot Special received a teddy bear, while those who ranked in the Teens, Juniors, and Elders Specials were awarded cash prizes. An opportunity for the men to showcase

their finest hand drum performances occurred during the hand drum contest, which the judges recognized four winners.

This year introduced a unique twist with the "potato dance," which evolved into a creative awareness initiative using boxes of Narcan in place of potatoes. Participants paired up and balanced a box of Narcan between their foreheads, engaging in various tasks directed by the MC while continuing to dance to the rhythm of the drums, all without touching one another.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,
I'm writing from Thompson Falls, Mont., to give a "Big Salute" to Sidney Daniels and Nolan Milham for their work and execution of an education powwow for the Wabeno School students and faculty. This kind of event should happen at schools on, or adjacent to, tribal reservations across Indian Country. Well done!

I lived with my grandfather Billie Keshick and my mother Clara Keshick five miles from Soperton on County C Road. The only traditional dance I remember was from the early 1940s (I'm 90 years old) — a ceremonial dance held in the area between Blackwell Road and County C for a family member who was ill at the Frank Ka Ka home.

Grandpa Keshick put on his Sunday best clothes with the beaded arm bands and leg bands. He packed his drum, his favorite blanket and other traditional items. We packed some food, hitched up the horses to the wagon and drove through the woods on old logging trails to the Frank Ka Ka residence.

Tribal members brought food. Men helped build an arbor with tree branches and put a railing that was used to hang blankets so there was privacy to the ceremonies inside. After hours of ceremonies, food was served and the event was over.

I also got my tribal nickname of "beans" at this gathering because I stole an opened can of pork and beans from the serving table for myself and got caught eating most of it behind a

building where I had hid. Non-Indians called me "Lil' Bill".

A year or so later, the sheriff came to our house and told my grandfather that any further gatherings of tribal people were prohibited by law. Thereafter, the only tribal gatherings were those put on by the missionaries. They fed us, too, at their little churches.

I also wish to thank the tribe for sponsoring the *Potawatomi Times*. I have read (it) over the years about the development of community programs and cultural events that have educated and created a cohesive surge of tribal human development. Keep spreading the news! It's the only way we tribal urban people can keep up.



January Veggie of the Month: Broccoli

Nutrition Fun Facts

• Broccoli is in peak season during the winter and spring. It is, however, typically available fresh year-round and can also be purchased frozen.

• A good broccoli floret should have a green color and no odor. It can be safely stored in the refrigerator for

up to 5 days.

• Broccoli can be eaten raw, or it can be steamed, sautéed, roasted or grilled.

• Broccoli is a common ingredient to be used in stir fry, soups, omelets, casseroles and much more.

• Broccoli was first grown in Italy, where it was referred to as Italian asparagus.

• Broccoli is packed with nutrients. It is especially high in potassium, fiber and vitamin C.

• In one cup of raw broccoli, there are about 30 calories, 2 grams of fiber,

230 mg of potassium, and 70mg of vitamin C.

Recipe: Pesto Chicken with Broccoli

Ingredients:

- 4 chicken breasts
- 1/2 cup pesto
- 4 cups broccoli florets
- 1.5 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

Directions:

1. Preheat oven to 425 degrees.
2. Cut chicken breasts horizontally to create 8 thin cutlets.
3. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper. Arrange chicken on one half of the baking sheet and top each cutlet with pesto.

4. On the other half of the baking sheet, arrange the broccoli in a single layer. Top broccoli with olive oil, garlic powder and salt.

5. Bake the chicken and broccoli for 15 minutes.

6. Remove from the oven. Sprinkle mozzarella over each cutlet and bake for an additional 5 minutes, or until chicken is cooked through.


