



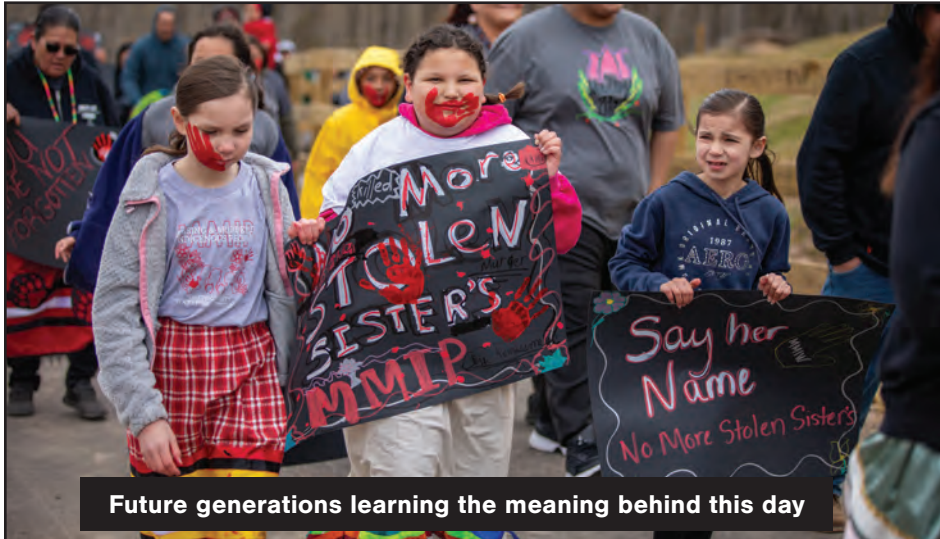

Future generations learning the meaning behind this day



Migwêthh to the riders for bringing more awareness to MMIP

Murdered and Missing Indigenous People (MMIP) Day is observed every May 5 to raise awareness and remember the thousands of Indigenous people who have gone missing or lost their lives across North America.

This day was chosen in honor of Hanna Harris, a 21-year-old woman from the Northern Cheyenne Indian Reservation. On July 4, 2013, she went to Lame Deer, Mont., to watch the Independence Day fireworks and sadly never returned home. Her story brought national attention to this issue, and now, on May 5 — her birthday — communities across America come together to honor those who are missing or have had their lives taken.

The Forest County Potawatomi (FCP) community stands in unity with other tribal nations across the country to remember and honor those affected by this tragedy. Unfortunately, these events don't just happen else-

where — they impact our very own community, too.

The day began at the Potawatomi Community Center (PCC), where both the FCP community and the Mole Lake Sokaogon Chippewa community gathered to view educational displays and statistical information. Attendees made signs for the walk, painting words, phrases, and placing red hand prints to demonstrate solidarity with the movement and draw attention to the cause. Some carried enlarged photos of missing or murdered individuals on the walk — a powerful tribute to their grief and awareness.

After the initial activities, participants enjoyed boxed lunches before the main event. FCP Post I Veterans presented the flags and staff as Fire Nation sang. FCP Chairman Brooks Boyd Sr. delivered heartfelt remarks, emphasizing the importance of unity on this day and highlighting increased awareness over the past few years. He

noted, "Although we have much work to do, we are making strides throughout Indian Country. We should be proud and continue raising awareness of this issue." The Sokaogon Chippewa Community honored Chairman Boyd Sr. with a blanket for his dedication and contributions. Other FCP Executive Council Members, including Treasurer Joe Daniels Sr., Secretary Alex McCorkle, and Council Members Destinee Alloway and Herb Daniels Jr., attended this meaningful occasion.

A notable addition this year was a motorcycle ride dedicated to MMIP victims. Shawn and Lisa Milligan led the group of riders from Stone Lake, Wis., into Crandon city limits, and back to PCC. This marked the first time FCP riders participated, amplifying awareness for this day and its significance to the community.

The day concluded at PCC, where participants gathered around a fire, listened to Fire Nation's hand drum

songs, and remembered those who were lost or remain missing.

MMIP Day serves as a reminder that behind every statistic is a person with family, friends, and dreams. It encourages all of us to listen to stories from Indigenous communities and to support efforts for justice, prevention, and healing. It was a good day to be together for this community event and to always remember the purpose and reasons behind it every single year.

During the week of May 11-17, 2026, National Prevention Week activities often feature sobriety feasts, family fun nights, wellness events, educational resource fairs, youth activities, and community gatherings focused on healthy living and prevention. These events encourage positive lifestyles while helping reduce stigma surrounding addiction and recovery.

On the night of May 11, 2026, the Argonne Fire Department, Forest County Sheriff's Department, FCP Family Services, and FCP Prevention team put together a laid-back community event called "Kickball with the Cops." It's a night where local kids and adults come together for a fun,

slightly competitive kickball game. The Argonne Fire Department brings the food — barbecues, chips, soda, and cookies — and everyone hangs out at the baseball field in Argonne to enjoy the evening. A cake walk was held at the end of the event for those who stuck around and wanted some sweet treats to take home.

This year, two awesome guests made time to visit small-town Argonne for this annual event: Ahman Green and Dorsey Levens. Ahman Green was a star running back for the Green Bay Packers in the early 2000s and held the team's all-time rushing record for years. Fans loved his speed, power, and ability to make big plays

— he and Brett Favre were a great duo during the playoff runs. Green was a four-time Pro Bowler and put up nearly 1,900 yards in his best season. Dorsey Levens was another Packers legend from the 1990s, helping the team win Super Bowl XXXI. He did a bit of everything — tough runs, key blocks, and catching passes — and was a huge part of coach Mike Holmgren's offense. His standout year was 1997, when he ran for over 1,400 yards. Packers fans remember Levens for his dependability and hard-nosed playing style during that championship era.

Having both of these Packers legends here — especially during National Prevention Week — meant a lot to

everyone. Their presence brought extra excitement and inspiration, making the event even more meaningful for the community as everyone came together to focus on healthy choices and support each other.

Nights like Kickball with the Cops show just how great our community can be when we all hang out, eat good food, and just have fun together. You don't have to be a Packers fan to have a blast — these are the memories that make this week such a great one. Big thanks to everyone who pitched in, and can't wait for the next one.

a simple compliment to a coworker's outfit, which quickly grew into a vision for an event that encourages confidence and self-expression.

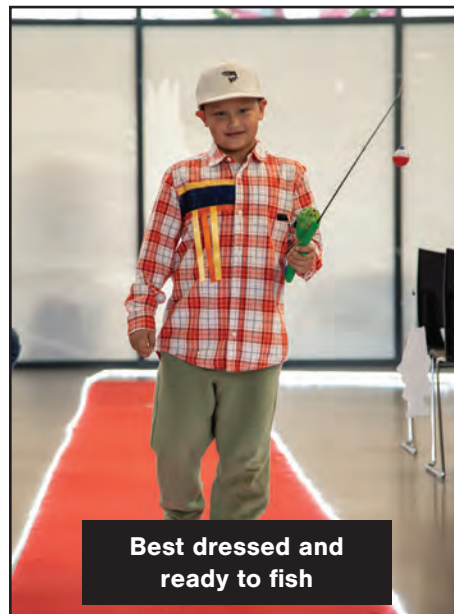

8th Annual Recovery Walk



Just minutes before heading out of Mole Lake

Each year, during National Prevention Week, the Forest County Potawatomi (FCP) community unites with neighboring communities, recovery advocates, families, and supporters for the Walk for Recovery, a powerful event held on May 15, 2026.

Since its grassroots beginnings in 2018 as a partnership between the FCP and the Sokaogon Chippewa Community, this annual event has grown into a meaningful tradition. Today, it stands as a symbol of hope, healing, remembrance, and unity in the fight against addiction and substance abuse, bringing together people from all walks of life for the past eight years.

The event welcomed elders, youth, recovery coaches, tribal leaders (including FCP Chairman Boyd Sr., Secretary McCorkle, and Council Member Alloway), law enforcement,

emergency response teams, families, and individuals in recovery or supporting loved ones.

The day began with a bit of rain, which turned into a beautiful, sunny day with decent temps, allowing for an approximately 10-mile walk from the Mole Lake community to the FCP community – kind of a beacon of “hope” given how the weather turned out and for the meaning behind this walk itself.

FCP Chairman Boyd Sr. and Mole Lake Chairman VanZile shared inspiring words and prayers with participants, expressing their pride in seeing their communities unite for this cause. Sokaogon Chippewa Community Councilwoman II Kim McGeshick has also been a driving force in the movement, leading, coordinating, and inspiring others on the journey to recovery. Many have been part of this

tradition since its beginning, and their enduring commitment continues to motivate those in recovery.

Community Prevention Coordinator Jorge Cisneros Sr. shared his personal story and how he found his path on the Red Road. He reflected on the first year of the walk, when Boyd Sr. invited him to join, and how it has since become a meaningful annual tradition for both of them.

Throughout the day, the group made several stops for snacks and water before concluding their journey at the Potawatomi Community Center, where a sacred fire burned through the night.

The walk and week’s activities were made possible by the FCP Prevention Team and Family Services Division, with additional support from the Community Coalition of Forest County, the Sokaogon Chippewa

Community, Forest County Sheriff’s Department, Health Department, and Crandon Fire Department. Countless others contributed throughout the week.

Each year, National Prevention Week features more than the walk alone. Activities include sobriety feasts, family fun nights, wellness events, educational resource fairs, youth activities, and community gatherings focused on healthy living and prevention. These events promote positive lifestyles and help reduce the stigma around addiction and recovery.

The Walk for Recovery stands as a powerful reminder that prevention matters, recovery deserves support, and every step taken together helps build a healthier future for the next generation.

Data Holdings at Indian Gaming Tradeshow & Convention



The Data Holdings team headed to San Diego to take part in the Indian Gaming Tradeshow & Convention, one of the most important gatherings for tribal gaming and enterprise leaders.

Throughout the event, the team connected with attendees from across the country at the booth on the show floor, sparking thoughtful conversa-

tions about the evolving role of data in tribal operations. A highlight of the week was Ryan Brooks' session on tribal data centers.

Beyond the sessions and exhibit hall, the conference provided a powerful opportunity to listen, learn, and exchange ideas with tribal leaders, operators, and industry partners.



Greenfire Hosts the Next Generation of Tribal Professionals

Greenfire, in collaboration with Potawatomi Ventures, hosted a First Nations Studies Roundtable Discussion and Mock Interview event at the Wgema Campus, bringing together more than 40 students from six Milwaukee Public Schools. The event focused on connecting education, culture, and career pathways while preparing the next generation for opportunities in construction and related fields. In partnership with First Nations Studies, Greenfire continues a long-standing effort to create access to industry knowledge and career exploration, supporting workforce development in Milwaukee and beyond through direct engagement between students and industry professionals.

The event was emceed by Michael Moe, Business Development Manager, who guided students and professionals through the day's discussions. Roundtable sessions allowed students to engage directly with developers, architects, engineers, construction managers, and subcontractors. These conversations walked through the stages of project development, helping students understand how teams collaborate

from concept through construction.

Students also participated in one-on-one mock interviews with industry professionals. These sessions focused on communication, preparation, and confidence, using structured questions and evaluation criteria to simulate real interview settings. The format gave students the opportunity to practice responses, receive feedback, and improve their approach to future career opportunities.

The Wgema Campus team, including Joe Tesch, Facilities and Security Director, and Jacob Menore, Facilities Manager, led campus tours that highlighted the collaborative effort of Potawatomi Ventures and Greenfire in renovating and activating the historic campus for the Forest County Potawatomi Community. Students learned how development, operations, and construction teams work together to plan, coordinate, and deliver projects that support long-term use and community benefit. fireside MARKET did a great job providing our guests with a delicious lunch at the Campus' Refectory.



Potawatomi Ventures Launches Bwadwét Innovation Community

The new Indigenous-centered hub invites Native entrepreneurs into a community of resources, mentorship, and cultural grounding.

Potawatomi Ventures announced the launch of Bwadwét (bwah-DWET) Innovation Community — named from the Potawatomi word meaning “the one who starts a fire” — marking a significant step forward in strengthening Indigenous entrepreneurship among Forest County Potawatomi Community (FCPC) tribal members and across Indian Country. Created to fill a critical gap, the Bwadwét Innovation Community provides the tools, mentorship, and culturally-grounded support needed to turn strong ideas into thriving businesses.

Bwadwét Innovation Community will host the first program, Ignite, a 15-week program that provides personalized guidance based on where participants are in their entrepreneurial journey. Ignite’s curriculum integrates business fundamentals with traditional knowledge, meaning it will be grounded in culture, and will feature expert guest speakers and community-building activities. Future offerings will include quarterly workshops, self-guided resources, and plans for co-working spaces and artisan storefronts.

“What began as a spark — an idea to help tribal members step into business ownership — is growing into a

movement designed to transform the future of Indigenous entrepreneurship,” said Alexis Harris, Director of Bwadwét Innovation Community. “At its core, the Bwadwét Innovation Community exists to uplift Indigenous innovators and ensure they don’t have to build alone. We are creating an opportunity rooted in culture, connection, and resilience, and we are excited to deliver a supportive ecosystem empowering Indigenous entrepreneurs at every stage of their journey.”

Primary candidates for Ignite, the 15-week program, include those with business ideas, artisans with an inventory of work they would like to take to the next level, or business owners. The inaugural cohort, which will begin on July 13, 2026, will be comprised of adult FCPC tribal members, spouses, and descendants located in Wisconsin warho the able to attend in-person sessions. Future cohorts will be open to entrepreneurs from across Indian Country. Grounded in our commitment to supporting Indigenous entrepreneurs, this program is designed for members of federally-recognized tribes who are building and growing ventures within their communities.

Through the program, participants will develop skills in core business fundamentals, receive mentorship




